

## FROM THE RECTOR



### PETER'S PENSE

Just returned from a conference on "Music for the Emerging Church." The Emerging Church assumes we have been living in what is called The Postmodern Era. Anyone born after 1960 is "native" to this era. Other generations are naturalized citizens which adds up to all of us. It is important for us all to consider this phenomenon since we all influenced by the post-modern world whether we know it or not.

Some key characteristics of postmodernity include:

- **skepticism about or outright rejection of enlightenment assumptions**
- **the rise of globalization & pluralism**
- **the erosion of authority and knowledge**
- **the customization and subjectification of truth.**

**The rejection of enlightenment principles** means a loss of faith in science and progress.

**The rise of globalization & pluralism** means (for example), that we no longer assume that only dead white males have something to say to us in literature; that our songs can be in different languages from the ones we speak daily; that the food we eat is not just local or regional but international. I was 29 years old before I lived somewhere a Chinese restaurant was available. We have over a dozen such restaurants here in Athens.

**Erosion of authority:** the roles and functions of all experts, gate-keepers and to some degree, the ownership elites are being called into question. This is very obvious in the unwillingness of more than half of any congregation to take the clergy's word for much of anything.

**The customization & subjectification of truth** means that people discover truth for themselves and only for themselves. We are used to the Creed saying for us "We Believe . . ." A postmodern creed says something like the Sheryl Crow lyric "if it makes you happy, it can't be half bad."

We should not be surprised that post-modernism influences worship. Worship in this context is "E.P.I.C." (experiential, participatory, image centered and connected).

One "aha" for me from the conference is that I am already a member of the Emerging Church. I joined in 1999 when I attended a conference sponsored by an Episcopal foray into the "Emerging Church". From St. Gregory of Nyssa Episcopal Church in San Francisco, I discovered a church that was believable once again. It was believable because it was honest; it was believable because it was centered on the ancient; it was believable because it asked and struggled with real as opposed to bogus questions; it was believable because it was communitarian, experiential, colorful, international, eclectic. All of the EPIC values were present in spades.

The commissions and committees that carry out virtually all of the ministry in this place are based on post-modern assumptions which call for things to move up from lots of people, not down from a few. Moving up includes gravity resistance as well as the usual friction. It may explain why some things take so long to happen!

## REFLECTIONS FROM KAT BALLARD



Emmanuel's EYC is taking on another 30-Hour Famine this year to raise awareness of and funds to fight hunger. This was a big challenge and a big success last year, and it promises to be so this time around as well! It was amazing to watch our young people transition throughout the course of the 30 hours during the last Famine. They began with the amazing energy and carefree disposition that youth possess (and that many of us wish we still had). As we passed through the night and into the morning, movements got slower and conversation waned. We eased into the foreign perspective of living a day on an empty stomach. This new reality was most obvious during our trip to Kroger's to purchase groceries for the Athens Area Homeless Shelter. Strawberries have never looked so juicy nor smelled so delicious! Further, each team of youth had only \$10 to purchase the greatest amount of nutritious food and supplies possible for the shelter. (See the picture on page 5.) For many of us, it may have been the first time we'd had to decide between the tantalizing box of donuts and a gallon of milk. Through this and many activities, the youth gained a new understanding for the reality of hunger that many live with.

This year we're pairing up with St. Gregory's youth in an effort to get to know our neighbors while doing some good in the world. On November 19-20, youth will fast for 30 hours in order to get a small feel for what it's like to live without adequate food. During the weeks beforehand they'll be raising funds. Last year we raised nearly \$1500! This year's funds will go toward the Interfaith Hospitality Network, and will likely be used to purchase the food and supplies that Emmanuel will need when we host the IHN guests in December. Please support our young parishioners as they work to reach out: you can give a donation, fast along with us for a portion of (or the whole of) the time, pray for hungry people here and around the world, and talk with an Emmanuel youth about her experience with the 30-Hour Famine.

# FROM VESTRY AND PARISH



## THE SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT ON RECENT MEETINGS

Every Vestry meeting begins with prayer, praise, song, and a devotion led by one of the Vestry members. Joe Napoli's August devotion expressed thankfulness for the numerous ministries of our parish, and Debra Harden's September devotion expressed thankfulness for the resources for every day living available to us in the Book of Common Prayer.

In its August meeting, the Vestry was presented with the news that Frank Henning had accepted the call to serve as chair of the St. Francis Guild and Robin Bewley had accepted the call to serve as a coordinator for the Wednesday night supper kitchen ministry. Butch Bush reported for the Finance Commission that budget work for 2005 was now underway. Jay Shinn reported for the Facilities Committee that renewal of the lease with the Potter's House was near completion, while preliminary efforts were underway to repair the damage cause by the July 26 lightning strike to the bell tower.

Led by Allison Clements, volunteers for a new "Vestry Cooking Team" stepped forward after Debra Harden reported that she was hopeful that more Holy Cookers could be recruited. Lee Gaby presented a report on the Vestry's efforts to gather information about its earlier efforts to contact non-pledging members. He explained that the Executive Committee and Stewardship Chair had given their consent to allow the wardens to invite non-pledging members to meet with the Rector.

The Vestry approved Sarah Fisher, Timothy Burger and Patrick Skutch, Emmanuel's seminarians, for ordination in December at the Cathedral and signed the letters prepared for the Bishop. A Vestry Nominating Committee was also approved to include the five retiring Vestry members and three others – Wally Eberhard, Susan Galis White, Bob Wood, and one additional person to be named later. During the Good of the Order, Vestry members recognized individuals and groups for their ministries including Ralph Stephens, Jim Wahlers, Duncan Krause, Penny McLanahan, Larry Hymo, Pat Oliffe, Cindy McAlister, Butch Bush, Bob Wood, Hal Cofer, Robin Krause, Naomi Norman, and Chrissy Marlowe.

At its September meeting the Vestry took an extensive tour of the Emmanuel campus and learned more about the special activities taking place at its "outreach properties." Julie Meehan of Community Connection and Randy Parsons of the Pope Street Association gave brief informal presentations during the tour. Jay Shinn reminded Vestry members that the only direct fixed expenses of the parish for the "outreach properties" were about \$10, 600 for insurance and taxes.

Debra Harden reported that the Vestry Nominating Committee had begun meeting and that Debra Lassister had accepted the call to serve as its ninth member. Butch Bush reported for the Finance Commission that it was working hard on the 2005 budget. He recognized Bob Wood for his special contributions and added that there will likely be a larger rental income to the parish from the Day School.

Brian Tison described some of the components of the upcoming Stewardship campaign and thanked Terri Tillman for her work in redesigning the pledge cards. The Vestry approved the recommendation of the

Finance Commission to make Emmanuel's 2005 pledge to the Diocese in the amount of \$55,000 with the understanding that the Vestry would work diligently to increase the pledge to the Canon's expected minimal amount of \$63,452.

During the Good of the Order, Vestry members received a prayer request for David Woodruff's father, gave thanks for the new Franklin Ferguson memorial in the back of the nave, pointed out the deteriorating condition of the Cobb House, called attention to the ministry of Sunday morning parish coffee making, noted with thanksgiving the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of one member's arrival at Emmanuel, and recognized the eleven members who attended Interfaith Hospitality Network Training on September 11 at First Baptist Church: Diane and Jim Wahlers, Merry and Allen Stovall, Diane and Harland Ehlers, Ann Darby, Leslie de Haset, Jay Shinn, Vince Howard and Lee Gaby.

The next meeting of the Vestry is October 27 at 7 PM in the 540 Prince meeting house. All parish members and guests are invited and welcome.

### **ALL SOULS' DAY EUCHARIST**

An All Souls' Day Eucharist (Commemoration of All Faithful Departed) will be held on Tuesday, November 2, at 11:00 AM. Special invitations will be sent to families of those at Emmanuel who have died since last All Saints' Day (If you have not received a note by October 27, please let Jerry Pope know at 543-1116.), but everyone is invited to attend the service and to provide names of their loved ones who have died. Call Jerry or Agnes Parker (742-2530) by Thursday, October 28, with names you want to have commemorated at the service. This is NOT All Saints' Day but an extension of that feast day and a ministry to bereaved communicants. The service has become a tradition at Emmanuel Church.

All Saints is commemorated on November first, and traditionally, All Souls on November second. Here is what *Prayer Book Studies 19: The Church Year* has to say: "All Saints' Day is essentially a celebration of Christ in his whole Mystical Body – the 'elect' and the 'saints' in the New Testament sense of these terms. On the other hand, popular piety has felt a real need for distinguishing between those saints who have been [so honored] and those who, while belonging no less to the body of the redeemed, are unknown in the wider fellowship of the faithful, but remembered in the more intimate circles of family and friends. We have therefore introduced on November 2 the entry 'Commemoration of All Faithful Departed' as an extension of the feast of All Saints." Remember, everyone is invited to this service.

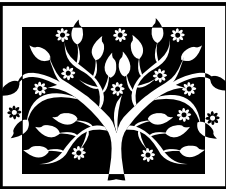

## OCTOBER URBAN ADVENTURE

On October 2nd the J2A group traveled to Atlanta for Emmanuel's first ever Urban Adventure. This is a part of the Journey to Adulthood program that takes place during the J2A segment and puts to the test some of the skills of adulthood that the youth are practicing (leadership, negotiation, and information management are a few). We teamed up with the J2A youth from St. Patrick's Episcopal Church in Atlanta for a day of work and fun! We began at Emmaus House where we helped clean the grounds and prepare for the Day With the Arts that was held there the following weekend. Then we embarked upon a giant scavenger hunt across Atlanta.

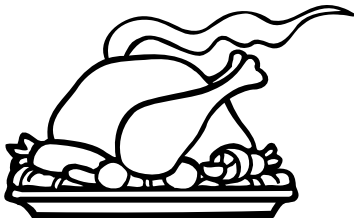
Our own J2A youth Stephen Anderson has this to add: "An Urban Adventure is when you go to a city (in this case Atlanta) and travel around it, looking for certain places, such as the Fox Theater. You are on your own, your leaders can't help you. You may only use the public transportation or walk. You win by getting to the most places worth the most points. This is what the Urban Adventure is all about."

Christina Stanfield remembers the Adventure as "a unique experience. I thought it was neat that we got to walk all over town and the leaders had to do anything we did. My group actually did make the leaders walk all the way from the CNN to the Varsity, because we didn't think it was as far as it was. . . . We took Marta to most places," and on the Marta trips the group met many different kinds of people. Many gave confusing directions and seemed not to know much about their own city. "One young girl asked, 'Zoo? I didn't know Atlanta had a Zoo!' . . . . One group couldn't speak English and could give no directions, but "they handed me a book of coupons, trying to be nice. Another person just ignored me." But Christina thinks "that everybody should do something like the Urban Adventure at some point in their life, especially kids, because it was something I had never experienced before. I had a great time, and I wouldn't mind doing it again."

We closed the day with a lock-in at St. Patrick's, and attended the Sunday morning service there before heading back, tired but happy with our experience.
