PETER'S PENSE

Daniel J. Boorstin, the distinguished University of Chicago historian and articulate Librarian of Congress wrote in *The Image: A Guide to Pseudo-Events in America* (1961):

When we pick up our newspaper at breakfast, we expect, we even demand that it bring us momentous events since the night before. We turn on our car radio as we drive to work and expect "news" to have occurred since the morning paper went to press.

Returning in the evening, we expect our house not only to shelter us, to keep us warm in the winter and cool in the summer, but to relax us, to dignify us, to encompass us with soft music and interesting hobbies, to be a playground, a theater, and a bar. We expect our two week vacation to be romantic, exotic, cheap, and effortless. We expect a faraway atmosphere if we go to a nearby place; and we expect everything to be relaxing, sanitary, and Americanized if we go to a faraway place. We expect new heroes every month, a new literary masterpiece every week, a rare sensation every night. . . . We expect everything and anything. We expect the contradictory and the impossible. We expect compact cars which are spacious; luxurious cars which are economical. . . . We expect to eat and stay thin, to be constantly on the move and ever more neighborly . . . to revere God and to be God. Never have people been more the masters of their environment. Yet never has a people been more deceived and disappointed. For never has a people expected so much more than the world could possibly offer.

Jesus cautioned about trying to serve God and Mammon. Boorstin gives us credit for the capacity to create perfect fakes, places like Disney World. People prefer the neoprene animals to the real animals. Often we cannot tell one from another. Why would the religious sphere be any different in a time when events don't happen, they are created for consumption. The religion bidness (and surely that is largely what it has become) is susceptible to the following gloss: "The religion (sic) business is a cruel and shallow money trench, a long plastic hallway where thieves and pimps run free, and good men die like dogs. There's also a negative side." --Hunter S. Thompson

Noam Chomsky is pretty suspect in a lot of quarters and he is a smart man. He noticed:

A poll revealed that 'faith in God is the most important part of American's lives.' Forty percent said 'they valued their relationship with God above all else'; 29 percent chose 'good health' and 21 percent 'happy marriage.' Satisfying work was chosen by 5 percent, respect of people in the community by 2 percent. That this world might offer basic features of a human existence is hardly to be contemplated. These are the kinds of results one might find in a shattered peasant society."

REFLECTIONS FROM KAT BALLARD



Prayer has crossed my path a lot lately. John and I have been praying together each night in the Advent devotions. Just this morning it spoke out in the form of the Advent calendar that was given to us in the December Tower (December 13 begins, “Need some help with prayer?”) I recently spent an entire weekend sharing ideas about prayer and praying with middle schoolers and their leaders at the Jr. NYC retreat (you can read Johnny Miller’s description of the weekend on page 11). I am starting to notice a theme here...

At the Jr. NYC retreat, we explored all different types of prayer. The chapel was transformed with masses of candles and with icons, with cushy pillows to sit on and pray. We prayed through writing as we created prayer flags. We prayed with prayer beads. We prayed through movement and breath. It was something else to witness those young people as they tried these methods out, and it became a haven for me in the midst of the rush that threatens to consume the Advent season.

I was asked to lead a workshop on yoga. I am enthusiastic about yoga, so I readily accepted. But then came the question: how is yoga connected with prayer? I was surprised to find that I really had to mull over this to come to a response worthy of sharing with the group. So I sought help in a great book from Maggie Napoli, *The Idiot’s Guide to Yoga For Kids*. There I read, “Yoga isn’t religious, but it is spiritual.” What a concept! That was the push to get the synapses firing. Practicing the movements and breathing of yoga helps me to slow down, to stop running through my ever-expanding to-do list, and to notice the present moment. What gifts God has given us in this very moment! Life, breath, community, quiet, senses to take in creation, physical being to do God’s work in the world... I’m sure you can add many others. This observance of the present moment unfolds into thanks and praise for these blessings, and becomes a prayer in itself.

There are so many ways to communicate with God. This is one that works for me. What tools of prayer work for you?

THE ROAD TO ENFAMIL IN ADVENT

“One of our families needs Enfamil tonight.” The call from Lee came. “Would you be able to bring some to her?” “Sure,” I said. Let’s see, Enfamil powder, liquid, flavors, can or bottle? What color is the label? Having never been a formula person, I needed detailed instructions. Living in the neighborhood, I ran to the nearest, larger grocery. Where is your baby formula? Aisle 9. Enfamil with iron, lactose free, large or small. What I was shocked by was the cost - \$4.35 for a small can of concentrate. How do families afford this stuff? (Food stamps the checkout lady told me later). I picked up four cans and ran to the express checkout, which is where this journey for me was really headed.

All week long I had been unsettled. The war in Iraq had finally become personal for me. A neighbor boy who our family had befriended had moved away to another side of town. He was always bright, smart, did well in school, was willing to work a part time job in high school for the extra expenses he needed. He, however, never had from what we could see very much family support – life always appeared somewhat unstable at his home. We always hoped he would be would be recognized with a scholarship and make it out of his tight existence.

Last week he drove by our house and stopped at the corner. We barely recognized him. He was all grown up but still with a boy-like face. His head had been shaved, and his expression seemed to have both fear and laughter at the same time, or that was what I saw. He spoke to Allen to let him know that he had just joined the Army. He was making his rounds in his old neighborhood. He drove off without out our getting his address. I literally ran after the car but he got away. I wanted to know his address. I wanted to be able to write to him. I wanted to be an anchor for his return. Did he have any idea what he was getting into? He appeared to be a true Innocent.

So, he had been on my mind all week; how was I going to reach him? He was not on my mind at the check-out line Monday night, as I was discussing the cost of Enfamil with the woman at the register. Just then an arm reaches over and waves. It was him! The Innocent. I yelled, ‘I have been trying to will you to come back by our house all week and here you are!’ So we talked and exchanged addresses at the checkout line. I felt I had been given a true gift in our synchronistic meeting. We connected on the crossroad to Enfamil. I believe God made the connection, but I had to be in the right place.


THE TOWER

“God is telling me... that true fasting is helping others, rather than depriving yourself.”

“God is telling me... that if we remember to help, to love and care for one another, then our own worries and troubles may become less of a burden to us and we will realize the power of the Lord to care for us all.”

Together the Emmanuel participants raised \$650 in sponsorships, which was given to the Interfaith Hospitality Network for the groceries and supplies that Emmanuel will use for its guests.
